## INTRODUCTION

For the 19th edition of the OIDP Award "Best Practice in Citizen Participation," we received **137 local democracy practices** from local and regional governments across 37 countries:

*Albania, Argentina, Benin, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Brazil, Cameroon, Chad, Chile, Colombia, Ivory Coast, Croatia, Ecuador, El Salvador, Slovakia, Spain, United States, Philippines, France, Guatemala, Iran, Italy, Kenya, Lebanon, Mali, Morocco, Mexico, Mozambique, Nepal, Pakistan, Portugal, Senegal, Taiwan, Palestinian Territories, Togo, Turkey, Uruguay, Uzbekistan.*

This edition marks a consolidation of the OIDP Award as a key initiative for recognizing and promoting innovative and impactful public participation practices. By collecting and showcasing these experiences, the award highlights the crucial role that local and regional governments play at the frontline of democracy. It also opens up a world of possibilities for peer learning and encourages new models of participatory governance to address today's social, environmental, and institutional challenges.

This year, the practices were organized into five thematic categories:

- A. Building More Democratic and Peaceful Communities
- B. Urban Management and Public Space
- C. Gender and Care
- D. Ecological Transition and Environment
- E. Civic Tech

**Of the 137 applications submitted, 133 were validated by the OIDP Technical Secretariat and reviewed by a first round of jurors, who shortlisted 40 finalists.** A second, smaller jury then convened to select the winning practice and the recipients of the Special Mentions.

The main evaluation criteria included the level of innovation in the local context, promotion of inclusion and focus on specific groups, achieved impact, sustainability over time, and—above all—**potential for systemic transformation across the territory.**

The Jury decided to grant the 19th OIDP Award for Best Practice in Citizen Participation to the **Municipality of San Luis Potosí (Mexico)** for the practice "Building Citizenship" ("Construyendo Ciudadanía").



In addition, Special Mentions were granted to six outstanding practices that were highly valued by the Jury:

- Special Mention for Urban Management and Public Space: **Turin** (Italy) - “Voci di quartiere: Civic engagement for the new Master Plan of Turin”
- Special Mention for Gender and Care: **Mersin** (Turkey): “Monday Talks”
- Special Mention for Ecological Transition and Environment: **Azuay** (Ecuador): “Ecological and Participatory Restoration of Wetlands in the Province of Azuay”
- Special Mention for Civic Tech: **Medellín** (Colombia): “Citizen Participation Index and Virtual Voting”
- Special Mention for the Most Supported Practice by the ODP Community: **Tilottama** (Nepal): “Green Clean Tilottama Campaign”
- Special mention for Durability, in collaboration with the Phoenix Project: **Niterói** (Brazil): “Digital Democracy and Social Participation in the Municipality of Niterói”

Through this award, the ODP reaffirms its core mission as a consultative platform for participatory democracy within the municipal movement led by UCLG. By promoting and recognizing innovative practices from local and regional governments, the award highlights efforts to foster inclusive governance – making

more room for people, in all their diversity, to take part in decision-making processes.

**In addition to being highly commended by the jury, all 137 submitted practices are acknowledged and celebrated through this compilation.**

**We encourage all those committed to building a stronger, more inclusive, and diverse participatory democracy to explore this resource and find inspiration to enrich their own work.**

In this publication we present the seven awarded experiences and provide a brief overview of all the candidacies, with direct links to the ParticipateODP platform for further details on each project.

*\*The content of each overview relies on the information provided by the applicant local and regional governments and has been adapted and condensed by the Technical Secretariat for publication purposes.*

Finally, the ODP extends its deepest gratitude to all the local and regional governments that submitted applications, as well as to the institutions and partners who supported the dissemination of the call. We also warmly thank the network’s collaborating members who took part in the evaluation process as members of the Jury, and the entire ODP community who participated in the open vote and contributed to this collective recognition of participatory innovation.



For this 19th edition of the ODP Award, the evaluation process involved **two groups of jurors**: one for the initial phase of assessing all submissions and selecting the finalists, and another for the final deliberation to choose the winning practice and special mentions from among the 40 finalists.

**The first jury was composed of 17 individuals**, divided into groups according to the award categories. Between February and March 2025, this jury carefully reviewed and evaluated all eligible applications. Their work concluded with the selection of the 40 finalists that advanced to the second phase of the process.

# Building Citizenship

San Luis Potosí Municipality

Building More Democratic and Peaceful Cities and Territories / 911.908 inhabitants



San Luis Potosí —also known as San Luis Capital— is an emblematic city in central Mexico, with a rich cultural history that combines its colonial heritage with a growing modernity. As the **capital of the state of San Luis Potosí, it is home to a diverse population of over one million**, with unique geographical characteristics that include densely populated urban areas and rural communities facing challenges of connectivity and access to basic services.

Historically, the **city has been a hub of economic and industrial development, although social and economic** inequalities persist. Marginalized areas have high rates of poverty, lack of adequate infrastructure and limited access to essential services such as drinking water and health care. In addition, the city faces challenges such as insecurity, the water crisis and the lack of citizen participation in public decision-making. Institutionally, San Luis Capital has a robust framework that includes the Municipal Development **Plan 2021-2024, which laid the foundations for strengthening sustainability, social inclusion and participatory governance. This effort continues in the Munic-**

**ipal Development Plan 2024-2027**, giving continuity to citizen participation through the program “Building Citizenship,” which connects the community with the government through innovative mechanisms of participatory democracy, addressing local challenges and promoting collective well-being.





“Building Citizenship” consisted of an innovative model of participatory governance implemented in San Luis Potosí to **strengthen the relationship between citizens and the government through the creation of 284 Citizen Participation Boards (CPBs), democratically elected and representing 100% of the population.** These CPBs became the key link in identifying needs, prioritizing actions and supervising the implementation of programs that impacted fundamental areas such as health, safety, infrastructure and sustainability.

The practice helped to **address historical problems such as citizen apathy, unequal access to services and the disconnection between the community and the authorities.** Tangible results were achieved, such as the **provision of more than 78,000 medical services** through the Health Route, the **rehabilitation of 390 public spaces on the Battery-powered Sundays,** and the **implementation of the Emergency Plan Yes to Water,** which resolved the water crisis through well drilling, equitable distribution of water in cisterns and the active participation of the JPCs to **guarantee social peace.**

Additionally, **structures of participatory democracy** such as the Municipal Social Development Council, responsible for approving strategic works and actions, **were strengthened.** The **inclusion of vulnerable groups** was a central pillar, through specific consultations for **people with disabilities, indigenous peoples,** and educational programs involving **children and youth.**

This approach consolidated a **replicable and sustainable system,** which now continues as part of the 2024-2027 Municipal Development Plan, ensuring its long-term permanence.

*“Building Citizenship” transformed local governance, promoting constant dialogue between citizens and the government, empowering communities and demonstrating how active participation can be the driving force behind a fairer, more equitable and more inclusive administration.*

# Voci di quartiere: Civic engagement for the new Master Plan of Turin

Turin City Council

Urban Management and Public Space / 852.877 inhabitants

Turin is the **fourth largest city in Italy** by population, with approximately 850,000 inhabitants, and the core of a vast metropolitan area with over 2 million people. Located in the northwest of the country, it is the capital of the Piedmont region and is situated between the Po Valley and the Alps. Known for its industrial past, **it was the birthplace of the Italian automotive industry with Fiat and today stands out for its diversified economy.**

Today, Turin finds itself at a decisive moment in its history: on one hand, it **boasts a solid economy, excellence in various sectors**, and a carefully planned urban fabric; on the other, it **faces demographic and urban stagnation.** After starting to lose residents in the 1970s, this trend continued

for decades, with a slight increase at the beginning of the millennium and a recent sign of stabilization in 2023. However, the city struggles to retain businesses, talent, and foreign populations. **The Administration's goal is to break this vicious cycle and unleash the potential and energy of the city, for the benefit of both current and future residents.**

The current **Urban Master Plan of Turin, the main tool regulating the city's urban development**, dates back to 1995. Today, the Administration is working on a new Plan that interprets urban and social transformations, balancing flexibility with public management. The goal is **to meet the new needs of its residents and create a dynamic and sustainable development model.**

'Voci di Quartiere' is an initiative promoted by the City of Turin and curated by Urban Lab, which is part of a listening and dialogue process aimed at defining the city's new Master Plan. The project's goal is **to stimulate shared reflection on the quality of life in Turin's neighborhoods, public services, and spaces, and to promote the inclusion of all voices in the creation of the future city.**

In 2023, the City of Turin, with the support of Urban Lab, launched **a listening process that involved institutions, intermediary bodies, and local actors** through a series of events and meetings designed to gather suggestions, ideas, and visions for the city. Two moments of dialogue and co-learning took place in June and November to discuss three central themes, key to the new Master Plan: economy and knowledge, environment and territory, and city life. Participants discussed the limitations of the current urban plan and future challenges, **gathering valuable input for drafting a new territorial governance tool.**

Subsequently the City organized a dialogue and engagement program in all eight constituencies through public meetings, information points, and an online questionnaire. **This program allowed citizens to better understand the Master Plan process, share their opinions, and suggest projects, emerging topics, or concerns.** The aim was **to make the participatory process accessible to everyone**, offering opportunities for discussion and feedback in every corner of the city.

In 2024, the 'Voci di Quartiere' project extended this dialogue to neighborhood residents by offering a series of meetings and activities to gather direct feed-

back from Turin citizens about life in their neighborhoods. These meetings were **complemented by a digital environment that utilized game and interaction tools** to engage citizens innovatively, encouraging active participation and creating a sense of belonging. **Participants had the chance to win prizes such as tickets to cultural and sports events**, boosting interaction and participation in urban dynamics.

**In 2025, the 'Voci di Quartiere' journey will continue with a new series of neighborhood meetings**, aiming to consolidate and expand the dialogue already initiated and share the results of the listening activities. In this way, the project is **consolidating as a lasting channel for dialogue and discussion** with citizens and local partners on the city's policies.

The inclusion of games for families as a participatory tool is particularly creative and impactful. The project's key strengths lie in its comprehensive vision and design. By placing neighborhoods at the heart of the urban dialogue, the initiative aligns closely with the real needs of Turin's citizens and plays a central role in shaping the Urban Master Plan.*



# Monday Talks

Mersin Metropolitan Municipality

Gender and Care / 1.947.375 inhabitants

Mersin, a major city located on the eastern Mediterranean coast of southern Türkiye, serves as a **critical geographic and economic hub**. Characterized by expansive agricultural lands, forests, and highlands, Mersin plays a pivotal role in shaping the Mediterranean economy of Türkiye.

With a history shaped by numerous civilizations, the city flourished during the Ottoman era and experienced significant growth following the establishment of the Republic of Türkiye. Today, **Mersin continues to expand through its dynamic sectors: industry, trade, agriculture, and tourism.**

The city's rich cultural fabric reflects the coexistence of diverse ethnic and religious communities.

**Internal migration and the influx of refugees have notably reshaped Mersin's demographic structure**, contributing to its reputation as one of Türkiye's most vibrant and dynamic urban centers.

In addition to the Mersin Metropolitan Municipality, the city encompasses a range of key institutions, including district municipalities, the Governorship of Mersin, the Mersin Free Zone, various chambers of commerce and industry, four universities, research institutions, private enterprises, NGOs, and numerous international collaborations. **Mersin International Port—ranked among the top 100 ports globally—stands as a cornerstone of the city's trade and logistics infrastructure.**

Agriculture, industry, logistics, and tourism collectively form the backbone of Mersin's economy. Its strategic location, coupled with a **strong commitment to social cohesion, sustainable development, and international cooperation**, underscores Mersin's significance as a leading economic and cultural center in both Türkiye and the broader Mediterranean region.

The Mersin Metropolitan Municipality has implemented the Monday Talks model to strengthen collaboration with non-governmental organizations (NGOs), enhance democratic participation, and **deliver more inclusive and effective public services**. As a city shaped by migration and cultural diversity, Mersin reflects the broader social fabric of Türkiye. It has long been a place where various cultures coexist, fostering a tradition of solidarity and a multi-layered way of life. This initiative seeks to build on that legacy, aiming to institutionalize collaboration between local government and civil society actors.

As part of this approach, **79 stakeholder meetings have been held every Monday, focusing on improving municipal services for women, children, persons with disabilities, the elderly, refugees, and other disadvantaged groups, particularly those residing in rural neighborhoods**. The strategic pairing of NGOs with rural communities—working in coordination with municipal departments—has enabled timely and targeted responses to local needs, resulting in expanded educational programs, awareness-raising efforts, and social support services.

Mersin's multicultural and complex societal structure has amplified the reach and effectiveness of this

model. **By integrating NGOs into decision-making processes, public services have become more transparent, accountable, and sustainable.**

**To ensure the long-term sustainability of the Monday Talks model, the municipality has:**

- Established **long-term cooperation protocols** with NGOs;
- Developed **internal coordination mechanisms** to facilitate NGO engagement within municipal departments;
- **Incorporated data and insights gained through this initiative into future local policy-making processes.**

This initiative has played a **key role in institutionalizing participatory democracy and promoting inclusive local governance**. Grounded in Mersin's strong tradition of social solidarity, the model has created a dynamic platform for diverse stakeholders to come together, co-develop solutions, and foster active citizen participation in governance. As such, it stands as an innovative example of collaborative governance in action.

# Ecological and Participatory Restoration of Wetlands in the Province of Azuay

Provincial Decentralized Autonomous Government of Azuay

Ecological Transition and Environment / 801.609 inhabitants

The Province of Azuay is situated in the southern region of Ecuador, within the inter-Andean corridor, nestled between the western and eastern mountain ranges. These geographic features have shaped a **series of valleys, where population centers have been established** since colonial times.

The name **“Azuay”** reflects its **Cañari origin and translates to “water that falls from the sky.”** The province is composed of 15 cantons and 61 parishes, distributed across the Paute and Jubones river basins. It encompasses 10 hydrographic basins, and its extensive water network spans over 10,000 linear kilometers, including rivers, streams, and ravines, as well as lake and lagoon areas exceeding 1,700 hectares.

Covering a total area of 8,172.71 km<sup>2</sup>, Azuay reported a population of 801,609 in the 2022 Eighth Population Census—accounting for 4.73% of the national population. The demographic composition reveals a **higher percentage of women** (53.04%) compared to men (46.96%), with the population distributed across **246,867 households, 40.70% of which are headed by women.**

In terms of cultural heritage, Azuay is distinguished as the province with the highest density of heritage records per square kilometer. Of the 95,403 documented tangible and intangible heritage assets in Ecuador, Azuay holds 15,765, underscoring its **significant historical and cultural richness.**

The population of Azuay increasingly perceives a range of **environmental challenges**, including the reduced quantity and quality of water, the proliferation of invasive vegetation, accelerated eutrophication, and changes in land use. These environmental issues, compounded by existing **socioeconomic difficulties**, **negatively affect the quality of life**, contributing to rising unemployment and migration.

**The core objective of the project is the ecological restoration of wetlands**, with the aim of recovering their essential ecosystem services—such as water and climate regulation, mitigation of droughts and floods, the provision of natural resources, and the preservation of biodiversity. To this end, social and governmental stakeholders have signed formal commitments to restore degraded wetlands across the province.

To achieve this restoration, **both physical and biological rehabilitation techniques are employed, supported by community engagement and awareness-raising initiatives**. These efforts seek to improve agricultural practices and address the socioeconomic issues that are closely linked to environmental degradation.

Invasive vegetation is removed using a combination of specialized machinery and manual labor. The extracted biomass is repurposed for local handicrafts and as raw material for organic fertilizer, while sediments are reused to reinforce protective buffer zones around lakes. Additionally, physical and biological

barriers are implemented to prevent the entry of pollutants into these fragile ecosystems.

**The project's methodology and management model are designed to strengthen community capacities**, recognizing wetlands as dynamic ecosystems shaped by internal and external factors—including local culture and climatic conditions—that must be balanced through adaptive strategies.

**This integrated restoration approach is the first of its kind to be implemented in Azuay. To ensure long-term sustainability, the initiative includes a robust community empowerment strategy.** As a result, notable shifts in public attitudes have been observed. Communities are increasingly identifying new opportunities to improve their quality of life through sustainable livelihoods tied to restored wetlands. These include handicrafts using totora reeds, ecotourism, and silvopastoral practices—all contributing to improved environmental, social, and economic outcomes.

Notably, **the local academic community has played an important role in this effort**, actively collecting and analyzing both qualitative and quantitative data on wetland ecosystems since 2021. Ecological restoration activities are currently underway in the Zhogra, San Martín, Guiquiña, and Busa lagoons within the Jubones basin, and in the Quingor, Chobshi, and Narig lagoons within the Paute basin. The long-term vision is to replicate these successful interventions across other degraded water bodies throughout the province.

# Citizen Participation Index and Virtual Voting

Medellin Municipality

Civic Tech / 2.700.443 inhabitants

Medellín is the **second-largest city in Colombia** after Bogotá, and the capital of the department of Antioquia. It is located in the Aburrá Valley, a central region of the Andes Mountains, in northwestern South America. The city's population is estimated at 2.700.443 at the 2018 census. The metro area of Medellín is the second-largest urban agglomeration in Colombia in terms of population and economy, with more than 4 million people.

**Medellín is distinguished by its cultural diversity and the resilience of its inhabitants—both key drivers of active citizen participation.** While the majority of the population resides in urban communes, a smaller portion lives in rural districts, requiring differentiated ap-

proaches tailored to the specific needs of each area. The city continues to face challenges such as poverty and inequality, which were further exacerbated by the pandemic, even as it advances toward the goals of the 2030 Agenda and its vision of becoming a resilient city.

The Municipality, along with entities such as Empresas Públicas de Medellín (EPM - *Public Companies of Medellín*), plays a central role in promoting sustainable development. This work is supported by tools like SISBEN IV<sup>1</sup> and the Social Registry of Households, which helps to **effectively target social programs**, and the SIVIGILA system, which enables the monitoring of public health indicators.

At the socioeconomic level, Medellín currently faces a multidimensional poverty rate of 9.8%, along with widespread food insecurity, unemployment—particularly among women—and rising mental health issues. Challenges in the education sector include high dropout rates, while the housing sector reports a qualitative deficit of 13.9%. These issues also present **opportunities to strengthen the city through the implementation of innovative and inclusive practices.**

To consolidate progress and enhance the impact of these initiatives, it is essential to **ensure social inclusion**, adapt strategies to the needs of each territory, and **strengthen collaboration between citizens and institutions.** Moreover, **addressing gender inequalities**, promoting transparency, leveraging technological innovation, and implementing continuous evaluation mechanisms are all crucial to improving the effectiveness and sustainability of public policies and actions.

The Citizen Participation Index of Medellín (IPCM), which includes virtual voting mechanisms, **exemplifies the coordination of best practices led by the Secretariat of Citizen Participation** and stands out in two key aspects:

First, the IPCM is an innovative initiative that goes beyond measuring the quantity of citizen engagement—**it focuses on evaluating the quality of participation.** Developed by the Secretariat of Citizen Participation in the District of Science, Technology, and Innovation of Medellín, **the index assesses the actual impact of participation in local decision-making processes.**

Second, since 2017, **the city has integrated virtual voting as a complement to in-person participation**, enabling residents to prioritize public projects more easily. In collaboration with the Uni-

versity of Antioquia, **the IPCM was designed using a territorial approach** that incorporates key dimensions, surveys, and variables to evaluate the quality of participation on a scale from 0 to 1.

To ensure broader access and transparency, virtual voting has been **implemented across all 16 urban communes and 5 rural districts** through targeted strategies of pedagogy, communication, and community mobilization. In 2024, a total of 222 mobile voting stations equipped with electronic tablets were deployed, fostering inclusive participation. To enhance security and authenticity, **biometric facial recognition technology was introduced for voter validation.**

The initiative operates with a flexible budget, which reached 300 million Colombian pesos in 2025, allocated to technological infrastructure, staffing, and communication efforts. **Outreach is strengthened through the Citizen Participation Knowledge Management and Information System (SIGC-PC) and the [siciudadania.com](https://siciudadania.com) platform, complemented by community media, social media campaigns, and public space activations.**

The IPCM includes a **broad spectrum of population groups**, with a focus on social organizations and vulnerable communities, generating specific sub-indices by territory, age, and gender. Ongoing evaluation enables the identification of gaps and supports improvements in representativeness.

Thanks to this comprehensive model, **Medellín has significantly reinforced participatory democracy, recording a historical average of 79,910 participants in virtual voting processes.** This practice now stands as a reference in participatory governance, aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly those related to inclusive societies, inequality reduction, and citizen engagement as a foundation for local development.

# Green Clean Tilottama Campaign

Tilottama Municipality

Ecological Transition and Environment / 147.657 inhabitants

Tilottama Municipality is **situated in the central region of Rupandehi District, within Lumbini Province, Nepal**. It was established on 25 January 2017 by merging six former village councils of Rupandehi District (Shankarnagar, Anandavan, Karahiya, Makrahar, Tikuligarh, and Madhawaliya), with Gangoliya village council being incorporated later.

Geographically, Tilottama has an altitude ranging from 160 to 175 meters above sea level. The municipality covers a total area of 124.8 square kilometers and **experiences a tropical climate**. According to the 2021 census, its population stands at 147,657.

The municipality is renowned for its **rich social, cultural, natural, and biological diversity**. It is home to 58 different castes, including Brahmins, Kshetris, Tharus, Magars, Bishwakarmas, Gurungs, and Yadavs. The local population speaks a variety of languages, including Nepali, Tharu, Magar, Vadhi, Bhojpuri, and Maithili. Despite the variety of castes, religions, cultures, and traditions, Tilottama has become a **model of unity in diversity, with a strong culture of mutual respect and tolerance among its people**.





Launched on July 24, 2017, the Green Clean Tilottama campaign began as a **week-long initiative aimed at promoting effective waste management**, raising awareness about sanitation, enhancing greenery, and **preserving the local ecosystem within Tilottama Municipality**. Due to the campaign's initial success, it was extended to a bi-weekly schedule—a practice that continues to this day.

With **rapid urbanization, increased migration, growing industrial activity, and rising population density**, waste emissions in the municipality have surged, placing significant pressure on the environment. In response, the Green Clean Tilottama campaign has remained active and adaptive, focusing on sustainable waste management, environmental protection, and the enhancement of local green spaces. Over

the past five years, the municipality has invested NPR 3.5 billion to support this transformative initiative.

The campaign consists of the following phases:

**Phase 1. Bureaucracy- Government Driven campaign**  
Initially, the *Green Clean Tilottama* campaign was launched to raise awareness among residents about waste management and sanitation. The goal was to engage local civil society, the private sector, and urban communities in waste management efforts, promote greenery in the municipality, and strengthen the city's sanitation campaign through the active interest and involvement of the community. **The government played a key role in driving this phase, ensuring broad participation and collaboration across sectors.**

**Phase 2. User Committees Involvement**  
In the second phase, various user committees, such as drinking water and sanitation, forest users, irrigation users, and village development (Tol Biash Sanstha), were brought into the campaign. Private sectors, including banks, financial institutions, schools, colleges, and industries, also joined the effort and contributed to the campaign's continuation. **Through these community outreach efforts, the municipality was able to collect and manage 28 tons of waste daily**, ensuring proper disposal and recycling.

**Phase 3. Co-Production Phase**  
Recognizing the long-term threat posed by waste management challenges, the municipality shifted its approach in the third phase. Instead of simply managing waste, the focus moved toward co-production. In this phase, community users, cooperatives, and service users began producing organic fertilizers and recycling waste materials. **This transition allowed for better waste management**, as the daily generation of 28 tons of waste continues to be effectively managed.

A major milestone was reached **on March 15, 2023, when the campaign marked its 100th edition**. This landmark event was widely celebrated with strong community participation, including local residents, government representatives, NGOs, and other stakeholders. Activities included a human chain along the Siddhartha Highway, intensive cleaning drives, educational programs in schools, community dialogues, and tree-planting events.

In conjunction with the 100th edition, the municipality announced several new environmental commitments. These included the **adoption of environmentally friendly governance practices**, a ban on tobacco products, and the continuation of the "My Pocket: My First Dustbin" initiative to **instill waste management habits in schoolchildren**. This milestone also served as a platform to integrate critical environmental priorities—such as biodiversity conservation, climate change adaptation, and disaster preparedness—into the municipality's local planning frameworks.



Over time, the campaign has evolved from a top-down, government-led initiative into a **more inclusive, community-driven model**. Today, it engages service users, user committees, the municipality, and cooperatives in shared environmental stewardship. **This shift toward participatory governance has been instrumental in ensuring the campaign's sustainability and long-term success.** By empowering citizens in the co-creation and delivery of services, Tilottama Municipality has fostered a responsive and resilient approach to environmental management.

# Digital Democracy and Social Participation in the Municipality of Niterói

Niterói Municipality

Civic Tech / 516.720 inhabitants



Niterói is a municipality in the state of Rio de Janeiro, in the southeast region of Brazil. It lies across Guanabara Bay, facing the city of Rio de Janeiro and forming part of the Rio de Janeiro Metropolitan Area. Niterói has an estimated population of 516,720 (IBGE, 2024).

Founded in 1576 by the Indigenous leader Arariboia, the city served as the capital of the state of Rio de Janeiro for over 130 years, until 1975. **With a Human Development Index (HDI) of 0.837—the highest in the state and the seventh highest in Brazil**—Niterói reflects consistent investment in education, healthcare, income distribution, urban cleanliness, transparency, and fiscal management.

In the cultural sphere, **the city is home to Fluminense Federal University, one of the largest in the country, and leads the state in cultural investment, with per capita spending of R\$125.** It also ranks first nationally in per capita social assistance spending. Tourism is driven by iconic attractions such as the Museum of Contemporary Art (MAC), the Niemeyer Trail, and the Complexo dos Fortes, along with a vibrant commercial and gastronomic scene.

Niterói is also a **reference point in basic sanitation, with 100% of its population receiving water supply and 94.5% covered by sewage collection services.**





More than 50% of its territory is designated as environmentally protected, and the city features 40 kilometers of bike lanes. It boasts one of the best public safety records of the past two decades.

Ranked as the smartest city in the state and **among the top five in Brazil in the Connected Smart Cities index**, Niterói stands out for its innovation and quality of life. However, significant challenges remain. **Reducing inequality and enhancing citizen participation**—especially among low-income populations and residents of peripheral communities—continues to be a priority. This commitment is reflected in initiatives such as the one presented in this proposal, which seeks to build a more inclusive and participatory city.

The initiative to expand Digital Democracy and Social Participation in the municipality of Niterói builds upon the **city's long-standing tradition of social mobilization and active citizen involvement in public policy-making**. Instruments such as conferences, participatory councils, public hearings, and participatory budgeting have historically played a central role in democratic decision-making. However, in light of technological advancements and new forms of communication, it became essential to modernize and broaden the city's engagement channels with its residents.

In this context, **Niterói launched a digital transformation, leveraging social media to enable direct, real-time communication between the population and municipal administration**—facilitating the submission of demands and suggestions without the barriers of traditional bureaucracy. A key milestone in this process was the city's partnership with COLAB, a platform recognized by the United Nations in 2015 as the Best Government and Participation Platform.

**Innovative tools such as collaborative "Zeladorias" (community oversight mechanisms) and Public Consultations became central pillars of this transformation. These tools allow for the centralized collection of georeferenced citizen requests, which are then routed directly to the appropriate agencies—enabling faster and more efficient responses. Citizens are empowered to monitor issues, collaborate, and propose**

actions digitally, without the need for physical presence or administrative hurdles. From the administration's perspective, the platform provides a unified digital environment for tracking the entire process, optimizing data management and decision-making.

Over time, various channels for submitting demands were consolidated into **a single digital hub, fully integrated into the city's broader citizen engagement strategy**. This included absorbing records previously handled by sectoral ombuds offices and linking the COLAB platform with in-person services across regional administrative centers, thereby ensuring inclusive access at both territorial and social levels.

As of today, **the platform counts over 175,000 registered users in a city of 500,000 inhabitants**. Since its inception, more than 239,000 requests have been submitted, with steady growth: 39,200 in 2022, 51,612 in 2024, and 5,700 new demands recorded in just the first month of the current year. To respond to this increasing level of participation, **510 municipal employees across 142 departments are now involved**—figures that have doubled in the past two years and continue to rise.

This initiative has positioned Niterói as a national reference in digital governance. Recognition of its success includes invitations to share the experience at major events, technical visits from other cities, and its selection as a finalist in prestigious awards such as the OIDP Award and the Smart City Expo Brazil Awards, among others.

## Motivation of the Special Mention for Durability, in collaboration with the Phoenix Project

The jury has unanimously determined that the initiative "Digital Democracy and Social Participation in the Municipality of Niterói" merits the OIDP Award for the Durability of Practices. Among many outstanding candidates, **this initiative distinguished itself by demonstrating that the passage of time can foster not only the repetition of democratic rituals but also the evolution, scaling, deep-rooting, and institutionalization of participatory governance.**

Niterói's experience exemplifies how a participatory system can reach a stage of de facto institutionalization—when methodologies and impacts are not only sustained but deepened and diversified, becoming a vital and irreplaceable part of the city's governance framework.

The development of a multi-channel participatory system, particularly through the evolution of the COLAB platform, illustrates how digital tools—when driven by strong political will—can become catalysts for innovation. This approach facilitates dialogue between efficient public administration and new, dynamic forms of democratic engagement, enabling broad-based citizen participation in shaping public policies and projects.

**The jury recognizes Niterói as an exemplary case of a systemic and evolutionary approach to participatory democracy—mature, robust, and well-positioned to move toward even deeper formal institutionalization of its achievements.**

## BUILDING MORE DEMOCRATIC AND PEACEFUL COMMUNITIES

### OPEN ANTIGUA Antigua, Guatemala

Open Antigua is an innovative initiative in Guatemala that promotes transparency and citizen participation in governance. It includes measures like budget transparency boards, public session calendars, and access to municipal information. The initiative also encourages citizen involvement through the creation of the country's first Local Open Government Action Plan and Municipal Camps, where municipal leaders engage directly with marginalized communities. Open Antigua aims to inspire other municipalities to adopt a more transparent and inclusive governance model.

### AZUAY PROVINCE SPORTS SCHOOLS Azuary, Ecuador

The "Sports Schools of Azuary" is an initiative by the Provincial Government aimed at promoting access to sports, citizen participation, and youth leadership development. The program has provided 1,200 children and adolescents with safe recreational spaces and comprehensive training, helping reduce school dropout rates and strengthen social cohesion. Implemented in 24 prioritized territories, it combines sports with leadership and peace-building training. The project also prioritizes gender equity and the inclusion of vulnerable sectors. Its success has led to plans for expansion, with 71 sports schools planned by 2025.

### LOCAL GOVERNANCE NETWORK-DIR (RGL-DIR) Béni Mellal commune of Taghzirt, Morocco



The RGL-Dir, created from a doctoral thesis on public management, aims to strengthen Civil Society Organizations' (CSOs) participation in local governance in rural Morocco. Launched in November 2023, the network promotes participatory budgeting and fosters collaboration between CSOs and elected officials. The initiative combines traditional and digital participation, deliberative and participatory democracy, and representative democracy. With growing participation, the RGL-Dir has introduced tools like citizens' juries, enhancing CSOs' role in local policy-making. Its success has led to scientific recognition and has significantly impacted citizen engagement and local governance.

## BENITO JUÁREZ MAYOR'S OFFICE: THE MUNICIPALITY WITH SUSTAINABLE GOVERNANCE

### Benito Juárez, Mexico

The Municipality with Sustainable Governance practice of the Municipality of Benito Juárez is recognized for its high Human Development Index and safety, as well as its strong citizen engagement. With a population of 434,153, it has unique governance practices, including over 20 years of neighborhood participation in budgetary decisions and local consultations. Since October 1, 2024, the new administration has focused on sustainable governance, establishing a Directorate for Neighborhood Participation, training community mediators, and collaborating with the UNDP to align its 2024-2027 government program with the 2030 Agenda. These efforts aim to strengthen democracy, involve vulnerable groups, and drive progress towards the SDGs.

Notable initiatives include a corporate volunteering project providing primary healthcare and the Voluntaria-te program, which engages young people in community activities. These efforts not only raise awareness but also empower volunteers to contribute meaningfully to their communities.

The 2050 Büyükçekmece Vision was created to imagine a future for the city, involving all stakeholders and experts in shaping a democratic and livable urban environment. With urbanization increasing globally, the strategy focuses on using modern technologies and scientific methods to improve the city's quality of life. Developed with academic input, it reflects citizens' expectations while considering the future of all urban inhabitants. The vision prioritizes sustainable urban living through seven key themes, 18 strategic objectives, and 46 targets, all rooted in research. It serves as a long-term roadmap, fostering participatory democracy and sustainable development for the community.

The National Community Games of Colombia, founded in 1999 by Gregorio Salgado Mendoza, aim to foster community integration through sports, culture, and social development. Initially started with 15 communities, the games grew with the involvement of Community Action Boards (JAC) and formalized in 2007. They promote local culture and citizen participation, including various social groups, and are supported by public-private partnerships. With the backing of Law 2166 of 2021, the games have become Colombia's leading community social sports event, strengthening cultural identity, social cohesion, and participatory democracy.

The Urban Parish Assemblies of Cuenca, Ecuador, are annual participatory events where citizens address local needs, involving workshops, assemblies, technical analysis, and a Cantonal Assembly. Citizens identify and prioritize projects for the next year's municipal budget, with the Municipal GAD evaluating feasibility. This process ensures that actions align with community needs and contributes to equitable urban development. Continuous improvements in the methodology have led to increased citizen satisfaction and better budget planning. Cuenca has become a model in Ecuador for maintaining public trust through these participatory processes.

## ARTERIA, FROM GRAY TO GREEN Cuenca, Ecuador

Cuenca's ARTERIA project, part of the Safe and Sound Cities Program, transformed a public space on Av. Elia Liut to improve safety and well-being for young people. Designed by students, it included sidewalk rehabilitation, urban furniture, lighting improvements, bike lanes, and murals. With a \$20,000 investment, the project covered 1,750m<sup>2</sup>, added green areas, planted 3,449 trees, and installed 15 solar street lights. It benefits 1,478 people daily, with 75% feeling safer and 99% more comfortable. Recognized for its replicability, the project's sustainability is supported by the Municipal Corporation and community involvement.

## REIMAGINING THE FACE OF AMERICAN DEMOCRACY: DENVER'S PARTICIPATORY BUDGET Denver, United States of America

Denver's participatory budgeting program, the People's Budget, redefines civic engagement by allowing residents of all backgrounds, including those traditionally excluded, to vote on how public funds are spent. This inclusive approach empowers over 6,000 participants, many of whom are from underserved communities, to allocate \$3 million towards projects such as accessible sidewalks, new park lights, tiny homes for the unhoused, and community gardens. With a focus on reducing barriers to government, the program has increased participation from those who often can't vote, fostering a sense of belonging and connection to local governance.

## EQUAL RIGHTS FOR EVERYONE

### Doboj Jug Municipality, Bosnia-Herzegovina

The "Equal Rights for Everyone" project in Doboj Jug Municipality focuses on improving the lives of vulnerable groups, particularly people with disabilities and the blind or partially sighted. The initiative includes building vertical platforms at key municipal buildings like the public library, elementary school, and post office, as well as creating designated parking spaces for people with disabilities. A significant feature is the implementation of a sound library for the blind and partially sighted. The project aims to enhance accessibility and create equal rights for all citizens. Future plans include expanding similar initiatives in collaboration with the Association of People with Disabilities to further improve living conditions.

## STRATEGIC TERRITORIAL PLAN

### Escobar, Argentina

The Participatory Tables for the Strategic Territorial Plan (STP) 2030 allowed neighbors to discuss and provide input on the territorial model developed by the STP office before its approval. The process, both virtual and in-person, successfully engaged citizens and contributed to the development of the STP's Codes, Programs, and Projects. The key concerns raised included the protection of the natural environment, regulating urban growth, strengthening agricultural production, promoting social integration, improving infrastructure, and enhancing municipal planning capacity. Environmental and urban issues such as preserving green areas, improving services in remote subdivisions, and addressing traffic and land use were central to the discussions.

## CIVIC AUDIT: SOCIAL TECHNOLOGY FOR CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND DEMOCRATIC CONTROL

### Goiás, Brazil

Civic Audit, created in 2012 by the Institute for Inspection and Control (IFC), is a participatory tool that empowers citizens, particularly youth, to evaluate and improve public policies. Initially focused on healthcare, it expanded to education in 2019 through the Attitude Students Program in Goiás, where students audit their own schools, identify issues, and propose solutions. This methodology fosters youth leadership, civic responsibility, and transparency in public management. Now implemented in 7 states, 283 cities, and 1,085 schools, it directly benefits 44,950 students, strengthening participatory democracy and engaging young people in monitoring public resources and improving education.

## OPEN CABINET

### General Pico, Argentina

Open Cabinet, organized by the PICO Lab in General Pico, is a participatory program designed to bring municipal officials to local neighborhoods, allowing residents to collaborate with the Mayor and other officials on public policies. Using the CHE Method (Communities Weaving Strategies), the program fosters decentralization, participation, and innovation, enabling residents to contribute to decisions affecting their neighborhoods. Through meetings and surveys, citizens work with the municipality to improve their community, with the program coordinated alongside other participatory tools like the Participatory Budget and the Inter-neighborhood Council. This approach strengthens the relationship between the municipality and neighborhoods, improving policy efficiency and citizen approval.

### Grenoble, France

The Grenoble Volunteers project creates an accessible ecosystem to encourage citizen engagement through a digital platform and local support. Launched in 2021, it centralizes tools like the Participatory Budget and Citizen Councils, offering a welcoming space for involvement through both digital and physical channels. With a focus on inclusion, the initiative uses campaigns and partnerships with local organizations to reach diverse audiences, resulting in a 30% increase in attendance at the House of Associative and Citizen Life and over 8,000 visitors at events. The project's flexible approach, with regular evaluations, aims to strengthen the link between citizens and institutions, making participation more personalized and accessible.

## SAFE GUAYAS

### Guayas Province, Ecuador



"Safe Guayas" is a citizen security initiative focused on community participation, interinstitutional coordination, and enhancing the National Police's operations. Launched by the Guayas Prefecture, the project aims to complement government actions with strategies for prevention, social cohesion, and police support. Key components include seven "Care Blocks" offering services to vulnerable populations, youth programs like football and chess schools, and improved police operations with new equipment and checkpoints. A safe corridor with surveillance and video analytics will further aid crime deterrence. Preliminary results show significant reductions in property crimes and homicides, demonstrating the success of combining infrastructure, technology, and community involvement for sustainable security.

### Irapuato, Mexico



The Citizen Model for Peace in Irapuato is a strategy initiated by the municipal government to address the lack of peace in the area through dialogue and collaboration with the community. It includes a long-term citizen plan for peace with a vision for 2030, the creation of a Citizens' Institute for Peace to support community-driven initiatives, and a participatory budget for peace, allocating 3% of the municipality's resources to fund citizen-led peace projects. This model represents a historic step towards fostering peace through collective action and government support.

The "Participatory Budget Istanbul," launched in June 2021 by the Istanbul Metropolitan Municipality (IMM), empowers residents to actively influence how municipal funds are allocated to public services. This initiative aims to increase transparency, ensure accountability in public spending, and involve marginalized groups in decision-making. The process includes five stages: idea submission, evaluation, voting, results announcement, and project implementation. By prioritizing community needs, the model fosters efficiency, equal access to services, and strengthens civic participation, ultimately enhancing trust between citizens and the local government and improving quality of life in Istanbul.

The Voter Promotion Strategy and citizen participation in Jalisco fostered collaborative networks with sectors like academia, business, and civil society, partnering with institutions such as DIF, UNESCO, and the INE. This strategy aimed to promote informed voting, create connections with the community, and decentralize voting programs across the state. Engaging over 40,000 residents, it included innovative initiatives like workshops for first-time voters, a stand-up comedy event for university students, a music festival for voter reflection, and a recognition program for businesses encouraging voting. These efforts helped ensure broader citizen participation and strengthen democracy in Jalisco.

The Local Digital Participatory Democracy (DPNL) in Khombole modernized local governance by integrating digital tools to enhance citizen participation and transparency. Key tools included an annual report, a quarterly newsletter, live social media sessions ("Tik du Maire"), a monthly journal, and a Budget Orientation Debate (DOB) for citizen input on municipal budgets. These initiatives improved access to information, increased engagement, and included vulnerable populations through accessible formats in local languages. The project also streamlined administrative processes, institutionalized participatory democracy, and positioned Khombole as a model for other municipalities.

## YOUTH PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING

Leandro N. Alem, Argentina

In 2001, Leandro N. Alem Municipality in Misiones introduced an innovative Municipal Organic Charter with participatory planning, budgeting, and a Youth Council. Over 20 years later, Mayor Matías Sebely revitalized the initiative, partnering with CEMER, a research center focused on participatory budgeting. In 2024, they launched the Youth Participatory Budgeting (PPJoven), targeting youth aged 16-29 and allocating 40% of the annual budget to youth-led projects. The program includes specific youth sessions, young leaders in the municipal team, and a focus on non-adult-centered debates. The first PPJoven project was a Recreational Integrative Park, chosen as the most voted proposal.

The "ZERO DEBT" event organized by the Municipality of Lezhë aimed to improve public participation and transparency in local governance by presenting the municipality's financial status and future priorities to citizens. Engaging over 450 participants, including government officials and civil society, the event fostered inclusivity, with special outreach to marginalized groups and youth. It built trust and transparency, allowing citizens to propose ideas for future investments. The success of the event, which helped achieve Albania's first zero-debt municipal balance, set a new standard for inclusive, participatory local governance and inspired other municipalities to adopt similar practices.

## COMMUNITY GOVERNMENT - A COLLABORATIVE GOVERNANCE MODEL

### Lomas de Zamora, Argentina



In 2023, the Community Government of Lomas de Zamora launched the Citizen Participation Tables (MPC) as part of a collaborative governance model. These forums allowed citizens and civil society organizations to co-create public policies addressing local issues like security, infrastructure, and health. The MPCs, implemented across 14 Municipal Management Centers, decentralized decision-making and included previously excluded peripheral neighborhoods. Over 410 residents from 230 institutions contributed to projects such as telemedicine, pedestrian streets, and environmental campaigns. The initiative culminated in a 2024 Community Congress, where participants shared proposals with the Mayor, further enhancing local governance.

## GETTING TO KNOW LUJÁN

### Luján de Cuyo, Argentina

"Getting to Know Luján" is a citizen participation initiative that fosters dialogue among neighbors, particularly children, youth, and women, through guided tours of the department. These tours, led by facilitators, involve interactions with municipal officials and local stakeholders, focusing on government strategies and feedback from other initiatives. Since 2019, the program has engaged an average of 2,200 participants annually, empowering citizens and promoting civic values. A working group of residents, elected officials, and city agents developed the tool with expert guidance. By integrating public security, education, health, and leisure sectors, it fosters holistic support to prevent crime and promote community well-being.

## COMPREHENSIVE ANIMAL HEALTH, CANINE EDUCATION, AND RESPONSIBLE PET OWNERSHIP PROGRAM

Morón, Argentina

The Municipality of Morón initiated a program to address sanitary issues and improve relationships between residents and their dogs, following concerns about overpopulation, zoonoses, and poor guardianship. Participatory assemblies led to the creation of the "Responsible Pet Ownership and Canine Education Workshops," developed in collaboration with the Morón Municipal Animal Health Center and the Buenos Aires Veterinary College. These workshops promote responsible pet care, reduce incidents of abuse and bites, and enhance the human-dog bond. The success of the program, which reached over 150 participants, has positioned Morón as a model for responsible animal welfare, expanding its impact to neighboring municipalities.

## PROTECTION OF RELIGIOUS MINORITIES IN PUNJAB Punjab, Pakistan

This project in Pakistan focuses on advocating for the rights and well-being of religious minorities in the country. The campaign, driven by a commitment to democratic values and human rights, has involved protests across various regions, including Union Councils, Districts, Divisions, and provinces. Efforts have included sending letters to key political figures, such as the Prime Minister, President, Chief Justice, Senate Chairman, and the Election Commission, but no positive responses have been received. Despite these setbacks, the initiative has expanded to seek international moral support, aiming to strengthen the advocacy for non-Muslim communities' rights within Pakistan. The project's goal is to garner ethical backing to promote justice and equality for minorities.

## MUNICIPAL PLAN FOR MIGRATION GOVERNANCE Quilmes, Argentina



The Municipal Plan for Migration Governance in Quilmes, Argentina, is a strategy to integrate migrants and refugees through a rights-based approach. Quilmes, with a population of 636,026, is home to 43,968 migrants, representing 7% of the local population. Launched in 2019, the plan addresses disparities in access to public services, particularly affecting migrant communities. It focuses on four strategic pillars: access to rights, strengthening institutions, training and socio-labor inclusion, and promoting interculturality. The plan encourages active participation from local residents and aims to ensure safe, orderly migration, fostering a more inclusive and democratic society. This initiative is seen as an innovative model of citizen-driven development for local governance.

The Citizen Action Committees (CACs) in Saint-Denis de la Réunion are a participatory democracy initiative launched in 2020, involving 44 committees across the city's 40 neighborhoods. With a population of 156,000, Saint-Denis faces significant social challenges, including a 40% poverty rate. The CACs enable residents, elected officials, and municipal departments to collaborate on solving local issues. Since their creation, 170 initiatives have been implemented in areas like culture, social inclusion, health, and safety. The committees use shared diagnoses to address local needs and co-create solutions, with municipal support through technical and financial assistance. This innovative approach enhances citizen engagement, social cohesion, and the effectiveness of public decision-making, while also empowering members to contribute to urban renewal and other local projects.

The program addresses poverty as a multifaceted issue, focusing on health, education, housing, and employment, and is digitally monitored for transparency and faster responses. With over 73,000 services provided, it has reduced food insecurity and improved access to basic services, promoting family autonomy and inclusion.

They worked collaboratively, transforming the plan and then shared it in schools and community spaces, ensuring widespread access. This project demonstrated that children's participation is a real tool for change and showed that such an inclusive model could be replicated in other communities and policies.

The "Youth in Government" project, created by the Open Government Coordination, is designed to engage young people in public policy and open government concepts. It consists of two modules: a theoretical training on public policies and open government, followed by a practical role-playing game called "What if I were the Mayor?" that simulates public management and budget allocation. After a successful pilot in 2023, the project was enhanced with more accessible content, including visual elements like memes, and structured into a role-playing game using cards to represent public problems and budgets. Over 500 young people participated, and the project will continue with the creation of collective proposals for the Citizen Budget in 2025. The initiative aims to foster transparency and active youth participation in governance.

This was Taiwan's first participatory budgeting initiative for such a cause, engaging 4,218 students across four schools in proposal development, deliberation, and voting using a combination of physical and digital methods. The project enhanced fund allocation efficiency, strengthened democratic participation, and built youth civic capacity. It also improved community-government relations and created a replicable model for participatory engagement in public administration.

The process includes four phases: training the auditing team, selecting citizens for the audit through a lottery, conducting participatory workshops to assess various service aspects, and compiling proposals for policy improvement. In 2024, over a thousand citizens applied to participate. The initiative focuses on social, environmental, and territorial dimensions, ensuring policies are more inclusive and effective. The final output is a citizens' report with recommendations for improving public services.

Over 11 cycles, 147 projects have been funded, totaling €1.47 million. The ongoing third cycle, starting in late 2024, continues with citizens submitting ideas, voting, and prioritizing projects to improve local governance, resource allocation, and social justice in the community.

Tirana's cycling transformation has created over 62 kilometers of protected bike lanes and pedestrian-friendly streets, promoting cycling as a sustainable urban mobility mode. It aligns with multiple Sustainable Development Goals, particularly SDG 11, 3, and 13, while fostering gender-inclusive mobility and community engagement.




